Dear Friend

By co-incidence I am writing this immediately following a highly enjoyable visit to York at the invitation of the York Archaeological Trust. We have close ties with the Trust and indeed they offer FMNH members reciprocal benefits. We lent them Manx Viking material for an exhibition in York last year and our current exhibition — Heroes — is one of their touring shows. Later in the year we are taking another Viking show from them on the theme of Valhalla.

Every year YAT hosts a major Viking Festival with hundreds of costumed re-enactors on the streets of the city and a host of special events ranging from "Beowulf by Candlelight" to "King Canute's Wedding Banquet". The event this year also marked the launch of a new fundraising campaign to rebuild the famous Yorvik Viking centre which received substantial flood damage in December 2015. In their publicity they use the term "re-imagining" to describe the process of upgrading the content and approach to an attraction which is nearly 30 years old.

I quite like that term "re-imagining" because it neatly describes what we have been doing here at Manx National Heritage in terms of upgrading our displays and facilities. We had several drivers for this when we embarked on the programme and several years later the results are beginning to show.

The first driver was simple: the age of many of our displays and facilities. An average museum display is built to last 15 to 20 years, but often they end up lasting for a lot longer. Apart from the obvious wear and tear caused by hundreds of thousands of visitors, electrical and technical systems need replacing, walls need repainting, carpets need replacing and so on. In some cases we have made new discoveries or indeed new scientific evidence means we have to tell different stories. Some of our displays are now very old indeed.

A second driver was a better understanding of the audience we served and the way we had designed our interpretation. In our research many local people told us they only visited when they had guests, as nothing had changed since they last visited. They also told us that some things such as the computer inter actives were now old-fashioned. We were also failing to attract local families and hadn't really picked up on the fact that a typical family group has several generations in it. Indeed many children are brought by grandparents supporting hardworking families. Sometimes we made things worse by only offering a limited choice of interpretation or inflexible techniques not suitable for all our visitors.

A third driver is the simple economic fact that the annual revenue support we get from the Isle of Man Government continues to decline as the Government balances its budget. Rather than close things down and reduce the level of service we are working hard to increase income from admissions and trading. Many of our facilities did not reflect that need.

Driven by these factors we embarked a few years ago on a substantial programme of intervention at a number of our sites. Each intervention is not very substantial or expensive but the cumulative investment is now beginning to make a real difference. Rushen Abbey was the first major "family friendly" investment and we are seeing substantial numbers of local families using the site. For the first time ever we opened up Rushen Abbey at the February half-term weekend and were really pleased by the numbers who came. The House of Mannanan has seen several interventions in the last three years but the new "Kingdom" gallery was the first change behind the pay barrier. The first week of February saw over 1500 visitors to the site — well up on previous years. The builders are in at the Manx Museum again and a newly cleaned and restored Great Dear will soon greet visitors to a new Geology Gallery.

FMNH continues to give us amazing support. Because of this we were able to double the amount of work we could do at the House of Mannanan. I am very grateful. As we continue our programme of "re-imagining" I am sure there will be many more opportunities to collaborate and add value.

Our relationship with our Friends continues to strengthen and adapt as the world around us changes. This coming year we will be looking more closely at volunteering within MNH and how we can increase opportunities for Friends to get more involved. We'll also be using the programme funded by the Donnie Collister Bequest to improve training and support.

A small but significant recent milestone we passed was the number of "Likes" on facebook surpassing 8000. I know that social media is not for everyone (and, don't worry, we have no intention of abandoning print) but this medium is immediate and cheap. We post things we hope people find interesting several times a week and it's the best way of finding out about special offers and new activities. If you want help in accessing it just get in touch.
